### **Energy**

The Recovery Act provides funding to improve the delivery of clean, renewable energy and to improve energy efficiency in homes and buildings across the state.

### **Law Enforcement**

The Recovery Act provides funding to improve local and tribal law enforcement, to combat violence against women, to fight internet crimes against children, to improve the functioning of the criminal justice system, to assist victims of crime, and to support youth mentoring.

### **Military and Veterans Construction**

## **Health Care**

The Recovery Act provides funding to hospitals and public health care programs such as Medicaid.

## **Environment**

The Recovery Act provides funding to projects for EPA Super Fund Clean-Up, Hazardous Fuels Reduction, USDA Forest Lands, and development of the Interior.

- \$500,000** to Fryingpan-Arkansas Project - MTE-SF6 Breaker maintenance
- \$395** to Fryingpan Arkansas Project - South Outlet Works Gate Operator Repair
- \$300,000** to Fryingpan Arkansas Project - Turbine Runner Replacement
- \$700,000** to Fryingpan Arkansas Project - Power Plant Rehab
