## **Energy**

The Recovery Act provides funding to improve the delivery of clean, renewable energy and to improve energy efficiency in homes and buildings across the state.

## **Law Enforcement**

The Recovery Act provides funding to improve local and tribal law enforcement, to combat violence against women, to fight internet crimes against children, to improve the functioning of the criminal justice system, to assist victims of crime, and to support youth mentoring.

## **Helping Those Most Vulnerable**

The Recovery Act provides funds for shelter, feeding, food distribution through food pantries and food banks, one-month assistance with rent, mortgage and utility payments to prevent evictions, and transition assistance.

## **Affordable Housing**

The Recovery Act provides funding for affordable, quality housing for those who need it most.

## **Education**

The Recovery Act provides funding to save teacher jobs, improve schools and ensure Colorado kids have access to a quality and competitive education.

### **Military and Veterans Construction**

The Recovery Act provides funding to upgrade building facilities at military installations and VA healthcare facilities and cemeteries.

**\$5,000,000** to Cheyenne Mountain Air Force Station

### **Health Care**

The Recovery Act provides funding to hospitals and public health care programs such as Medicaid.

**\$6,276,000** to Peak Vista Community Health Centers

**Environment**

The Recovery Act provides funding to projects for EPA Super Fund Clean-Up, Hazardous Fuels Reduction, USDA Forest Lands, and Department of the Interior.

**\$4,500,000** to El Paso County Wildland Fire Management

**\$1,200,000** to Teller County Wildland Fire Management
