

"Colorado recorded over 47,000 eviction filings in 2024, a 20 percent increase from the prior year. Each filing puts a household's housing and economic security at risk, with consequences that can disrupt employment, children's education, health, and community ties. Too many tenants facing eviction in Colorado, and across the country, cannot access timely financial or legal help. Most must navigate a complex court process on their own. The Eviction Crisis Act would provide communities with practical tools to prevent avoidable displacement. It would interrupt the cycles of poverty that eviction reinforces, including emergency assistance, grants for landlord-tenant community courts, and data to help policymakers understand the scale of the crisis and identify effective interventions. By reducing the harms caused by eviction, this bipartisan legislation would allow Colorado families to continue on the path toward economic security.
